

Age-Adjusted Death Rate, All Drug Overdoses, Michigan and the United States




Age-Adjusted Death Rate, All Drug Overdoses, Michigan and the United States

Substance Use Response Framework (Goals)



Emphasis on EQUITY and DATA

Primary Prevention

- Prevent new substance misuse and addiction.
- Prevent inappropriate prescribing of drugs with addictive potential.
- Prevent generational trauma and addiction.

Harm Reduction

- Prevent drug overdoses.
- Reverse opioid overdoses.
- Decrease medical complications of drug use.
- Improve health outcomes for people who use drugs.

Treatment

- Expand access to treatment modalities for substance use.
- Improve quality of care and increase treatment retention.
- Bridge the gaps in transitions of care.

Recovery Support


- Increase access to all recovery pathways.
- Expand access to key economic supports for people in recovery.
- Improve health outcomes for people in recovery.

Long-Term Strategic Plan






If we do nothing, where will we be in 18 years?



NARCAN Direct Naloxone Kits Distributed by Fiscal Year




Settlement funds allowed the NARCAN Direct Portal to distribute an additional 147,000 NARCAN kits to 404 unique organizations and 2,605 overdose reversals were reported.

FY 2023 Opioid Settlement: Community Impact





97 Syringe Service Program sites reached **over 30,000 client encounters**, provided **81,000 naloxone kits**, **73,000 fentanyl test strips**, **5,000 xylazine test strips** and led to **4,796 overdose reversals**.



The naloxone portal distributed 147,000 NARCAN kits, 404 unique organizations ordered through the portal and 2,605 overdose reversals were reported.



Michigan Department of Corrections provided approximately **1,342 doses of injectable buprenorphine** to inmates across **10 prison sites**.



Four Recovery Community Organizations provided recovery support services to individuals with opioid use disorder (OUD), including peer recovery coaching, connections to services, and substance-free activities and events.

FY 2023 Opioid Settlement: Community Impact, Continued





Michigan Model for Health provided more than *6,000 digital licenses* to teachers across *625 school districts* to access the web-based primary prevention curriculum for their students.



Technical assistance provided to **23 counties** by the Technical Assistance Collaborative to inform local governments' evidence-based investment decisions for local settlement funds.



Grants awarded to *eight OUD treatment providers* to expand or enhance their *physical infrastructure* to *increase service capacity*.



Two hospitals began implementation process to **establish Rooming-In Programs** to support mothers and newborns born with Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome.



Approximately 50% of sattlement funds will be placed in the Michigan Opfoid Healing and Recovery Fund, which was created in 2022 by the state legislature. The Opfoid Advisory Commission, also created in 2022 by the legislature and staffed by the legislature council, is charged with making recommendations on the fund's expenditures. Support to Local Governments



The Michigan Opioid Settlements Technical Assistance Collaborative

- ✓ MDHHS contracted with Michigan State University, the University of Michigan and Wayne State University to provide technical assistance to local governments to ensure they have resources available to make the most impactful investment decisions for opioid settlements for their communities.
- ✓ Together with MDHHS, the universities have formed the Technical Assistance Collaborative (TAC) to share information with local governments regarding best practices for opioid-related issues.
- ✓ The TAC provides individualized technical assistance to counties requesting it, as well as educational webinars and resources that are available to all local governments across Michigan.











Technical Assistance Collaborative





Individualized Technical Assistance (TA)

- Local governments can submit TA request forms that are referred to the TAC for engagement and consultation.
- As of February 2024, the TAC has engaged with 26 counties across Michigan that have requested TA for their communities.
- TA requests have focused primarily on guidance for conducting community needs assessments and support for evaluation.



Informational Webinars

Local governments are invited to monthly TAC webinars that provide education on settlement-specific topics, including
evidence-based opioid abatement efforts, such as Settlement Agreement overview and compliance, determining local
needs and assets through engaged community assessments, and treating OUD in jails.



Resources

- The TAC links local governments to virtual resources on evidence-based opioid abatement strategies and is currently developing additional content to share.
- Virtual resources are also accessible to community stakeholders providing advocacy or are involved in community planning efforts.



Community Presentations

 MDHHS has provided numerous presentations to stakeholders across Michigan to provide an overview of settlementrelated efforts and network with local communities to connect them to information and resources.

Opioid Settlement Technical Assistance Collaborative

As of February 2024, **26 counties** have engaged with the TAC for technical assistance on evidence-based investments for their opioid settlement funds.

Moving forward, MDHHS will utilize funds to incentivize local government collaboration on evidence-based, impactful investments.
